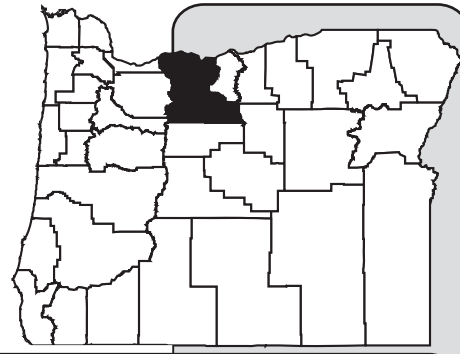

Assignment The Mid-Columbia Economic Development District was established in 1969 by its five member counties who realized that by sharing a common workforce, a common geography and a number of other important factors, their economic fates were tied together. They realized that by joining together they would benefit from better access to economic development loans and grants, pooled technical assistance, marketing, and administrative resources, and most importantly, they would be able to bring a regional approach to their economic development efforts. Over the years Mid-Columbia Economic Development District's membership has grown to include cities, ports and chambers of commerce within the five county region.

The RARE participant placed with the Mid-Columbia Economic Development District will act as the coordinator on an array of economic development projects. Specifically, the participant will convene and conduct surveys, interviews, and focus group meetings needed to develop a strategic/sustainability plan; work to increase community support for the Columbia Gorge Sustainability Consortium; and seek opportunities that advance goals and implementation strategies that address housing, transportation, workforce training, and economic development.
