

Medical School Preparation at the University of Oregon

Did you know?

- There are two types of medical schools: allopathic (MD programs) and osteopathic (DO programs).
 Though distinct in their philosophical approaches to medical care, both prepare fully licensed physicians.
- You don't have to decide your specialty area before applying to medical school. In fact, exploring your interests in medical school is encouraged. Some specialties include anesthesiology, family and general medicine, pediatrics, internal medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, psychiatry, and surgery.
- Medical education typically takes 7-12 years to complete, including 4 years of medical school and 3-8 years of training in a specialty area. The yearly median cost of tuition, fees, and health insurance ranges from \$36,427-\$57,472.

Medical School Application Preparation

- Completing the prerequisite courses is just one aspect of the process. You must also have a well-rounded
 application consisting of experience (shadowing, volunteer work, undergraduate research, life experience,
 etc.), letters of recommendation, MCAT scores, and a strong admissions essay.
- Medical schools look for students who chose meaningful experiences that they are able to reflect upon during the application process.
- Applying to medical school is a year-long process. Students applying in their final year at UO will have a gap
 year before starting medical school. Students can work, take courses, travel, etc. during the year. Keep in
 mind, the average age of a first-year medical student is 24.
