

Getting Started

Student ID

First thing's first... you'll need to get your student ID, called a DartCard. Head over to the Dartmouth Card Office in the basement of '53 Commons to get yours made on the spot. Your DartCard is your passport to life at Dartmouth. You can also add money to it (called your DA\$H account) in order to pay for food, tickets, vending machines, equipment rentals, etc. Your DartCard also allows you free entry to the gym, and it's your library card too!

Banner

The Banner Student System allows students to conduct official transactions and to obtain personal and academic information, including:

- √ Grades
- √ Checking in for the term
- √ Scheduling classes
- √ Managing your DA\$H balance
- ✓ Tuition statements
- √ Health record information



Before going any further, head on over to the Banner site, click on the "Student/Faculty Self Service" link on the left, then "Graduate Arts & Sciences Student Main Menu", and familiarize yourself with the various tabs and functions.

More Banner

Check-in

Before each term begins, all students are required to check-in for classes prior to registering. You can do this by clicking on the "Check-In [Term]" link once you're signed into your Banner account.

Course Registration

This should be done as soon as you arrive on campus. Contact your specific program advisor to discuss your individual degree requirements. Once ready to register, simply log into Banner, click on "Add/Drop/Course Selection," and follow the prompts. Note that not all courses are offered every term, so plan your schedule carefully. Course numbers below 100 are undergraduate offerings, while graduate level courses are all over 100.

Health Forms

Banner is also the place to complete your Incoming Student Health Forms. Click on "Health Center On-Line Services" and click on "Forms" in the pop-up window. These forms must be completed when you arrive on campus.

Health Care

Dartmouth requires all active students to have health insurance meeting specified standards of coverage. To learn more about the Student Group Health Plan, visit their website. To learn more about Dick's House (the health clinic at Dartmouth) and specific health care services offered at Dartmouth, please visit their website.

Getting Started

Email

Dartmouth uses a Microsoft Online Services system for email, calendar, and collaboration tools for everyone at Dartmouth. You will need to have your NetID on hand to log in to your email. This can be found on your DartCard as it's also your Dartmouth ID number. If you don't have it on hand, simply go to the NetID Lookup page. After that, log in through through the BWA site with your NetID and Password to access your email. To look up the contact information for every student/faculty member on campus, visit the Directory on the Dartmouth College website.

Canva:

Canvas is the site used to manage your classes, view assignments, print class slides, send course-wide emails, download necessary class documents, etc. Simply sign into Canvas the same way as Banner.

Stipend Information

If you receive a stipend, your first paycheck will arrive on October 1 and monthly on the first thereafter. Your initial paycheck will be for half a month's pay, so plan accordingly. You will need to fill out hiring forms and provide identification documentation to the Payroll Office located at 7 Lebanon Street, Suite 309 in Hanover. You may consider filling out a Direct Deposit form to access your funds immediately once they are available on the first of each month. Visit Payroll's webpage to learn more.

Parking &

Parking

The fee for parking on campus is \$168 per year July 1 - June 30. The fee is prorated by the term. Contact the Parking Office (located at 6 Vox Lane, McKenzie Hall, between the Hopkins Center and Alumni Gym) at 603-646-2340 for detailed explanations. When registering your vehicle you will need your car's registration and your driver's license. You may register more than one car (if alternating vehicles) for the same fee.

Public Transportation

Public buses that run throughout the Upper Valley are FREE to all riders. Click for the latest bus schedules and routes.

Dartmouth Coach

The Dartmouth Coach is a private bus company offering direct service to/from Boston (South Station and the airport) and NYC from the Upper Valley. Check 'em out!

<u>Lebanon Community Chorus:</u> Averaging about 40-50 adults, this choir gets together to practice once/week.


<u>North Country Community Theatre:</u> A non-profit devoted to promoting the performing arts in the Upper Valley.

Museums and Educational

<u>Billings Farm and Museum</u> in Woodstock, VT: Explore one of the finest operating dairy farms in America.

<u>Dartmouth Center for the Advancement of Learning:</u>

DCAL serves all those pursuing or considering careers in teaching in through engaging workshops.

<u>Enfield Shaker Museum</u> in Enfield, NH: For over 200 years, this community practiced equality, celibacy, and pacifism.

<u>Hood Museum of Art</u> in Hanover, NH: This teaching art museum houses over 60,000 items in its full collection, with changing installations as well.

Montshire Museum of Science in Norwich, VT: This hands on museum offers fun, interactive exhibits on 110 acres along the Connecticut River. Perfect for a family outing!

<u>Vins Nature Center</u> in Quechee, VT: Visit raptors and songbirds, frogs, fish, turtles, and fauna/flora in this outdoor wonder.

<u>Dartmouth Athletics:</u> All Dartmouth sporting events are free to attend with your student DartCard. Catch football in the fall, basketball in the late fall, hockey in the winter, and a plethora of spring sports as well. Schedules for each sport are listed <u>online</u>.

Hanover Country Club: This is a college-owned facility that was expanded to 18 holes in 1922. It is open to the public and students. Annual memberships may be obtained through the Pro Shop.

More Recreation

<u>James W. Campion III Ice Skating Rink:</u> Just a mile down Route 10 from Hanover, it offers year-round iceskating.

Norwich Racquet Club: This community club has grass courts!

Oak Hill: Located north of campus, this facility offers biathlon training, mountain biking, picnics, cross country skiing, swimming, tennis, and camping.

<u>Upper Valley Aquatic Center:</u> The UVAC is a state-of-the-art swimming facility located in White River Junction, VT.

<u>Dartmouth Outing Club</u>: One of the oldest college outdoors clubs in the nation, its also the umbrella organization for many other smaller clubs on campus, including: Bait & Bullet, Boots & Saddles, Cabin & Trail, etc.

<u>Ledyard Canoe Club:</u> This group rents kayaks and canoes to students and the public from their clubhouse on the Connecticut.

<u>Dartmouth Mountaineering Club:</u> Come away for a weekend of climbing and adventure with DMC.

Hiking

It would be remiss to not mention that the <u>Appalachian Trail</u> goes directly through the heart of downtown Hanover. From Hanover, it's 1713 miles back down to Georgia, or 431 to Katahdin Mountain in Maine. In addition to the AT, there are numerous other hiking trails, camping spots, and other outdoor activities to take advantage of during your stay in the Upper Valley.

It's been mentioned before, but check out the DOC website for information on weekend trips and other outdoor adventures. The DOC, headquartered in Robinson Hall, also rents out equipment to Dartmouth students at a discounted rate. Check out a backpack, tent, even jackets and boots, and you're all set to enjoy every season in the outdoors. In the winter, the DOC moves to frozen Occom Pond 2 minutes from campus, where you can rent out ice skates or cross country skis.

Dartmouth also owns several cabins tucked away in the woods throughout New Hampshire. Thinking of gathering a group of friends for a weekend of swimming, fishing, and fun (in the summer), or snowshoeing, skiing, and s'mores (in the winter)?
