

# Negro Frat, Student Differ on NU Pledge Interest

There's a difference of opinion on how many Northwestern Negroes are interested in the Chicago municipal chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi, a predominantly Negro fraternity hoping for acceptance at Northwestern by the spring of 1968.

A fraternity official says five NU men are pledged. Roger Ward, a senior in arts and sciences here, says the fraternity has only one active pledge.

And Andrew Rodez, chairman of expansion for Kappa Alpha Psi, meets Thursday with Vice-President and Dean of Students Roland J. Hinz to attempt to have the fraternity accepted as an off-campus group.

The disagreement over how many NU students are still interested in Kappa Alpha Psi started last week when Rodez said five NU men were pledged into the Chicago fraternity in June.

Ward says that seven NU men were pledged into the fraternity in March, but that six have since become inactive.

"Actually we're still technically pledged because we haven't signed a letter of resignation," Ward said. "But we're not going to any meetings, and we didn't do anything during the summer."

Ward said the six became inactive when they were not activated by the end of spring quarter.

Ward said NU's Dan Davis worked at the

house over the summer and joined another pledge group. Steve Broussard, Herbert Milton, Harvey Blue, Roland Collins and Vic Goode agreed to become inactive along with Ward.

Some of the underclassmen are still interested, and Alpha Phi Alpha, a second predominantly Negro fraternity, has pledged four Northwestern students, Ward said.

"It all boils down to the fact," Ward said, "that Negroes like to be with Negroes. A lot of white people are under the illusion that Negroes want to be with white people. This is not true. Around the nation there is a feeling more towards the Ne-

groes being proud of the fact that they are Negro."

In his meeting with Hinz, Rodez hopes to find a "sound basis for university opposition to the reactivation of Kappa Alpha Psi." He said he also hopes to find how "the school's program to integrate fraternities has come along," and to determine "to what extent other fraternities have pledged Negroes."

If the social group would not be recognized by the university or allowed to participate in Homecoming events, Rodez said, a municipal chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi may be established in Evanston.

Ward said Tuesday: "It's a messed up situation."

## Dozen NU Students March In Chicago Draft Protest

A dozen Northwestern students joined in the Chicago Area Draft Resisters (CADRE) protest at the Chicago Federal Building yesterday which resulted in the arrest of four participants.

The NU students, none of whom were arrested, combined with 150 picketers and 600 other demonstrators in support of 39 men who attempted to turn in their draft cards as part of a national protest against the Vietnam war.

Mike Edesess, NU graduate student in mathematics and CADRE member, called the protest a "success."

The group had not made any special effort to enlist Northwestern students, he said. CADRE representatives had, however, placed circulars in Scott Hall last week.

Gary Rader, a former Northwestern student and teaching assistant, spoke at the rally. Afterwards, he called the meeting "a complete success because we laid bare the government's inability to handle dissension."

Four demonstrators were arrested after trying to enter the Federal Building to turn in their draft cards. They were immediately taken before District Judge Edwin Robson for civil contempt of a 1965 court order banning unauthorized persons from congregating in the building, Roland C. Kumb, clerk of the court, said last night.

Kumb said the four were sentenced to ten days in the Cook County Jail.

Last night, he said, they had begun their sentences.

William Stevens, an attorney for CADRE, said he was preparing an appeal to free the men.

## Parietal Visiting Light

Parietal hours began over the weekend — without the participation of eighteen women's living units and one men's unit.

Participating units reported light turnouts. Only 160 men, or 12 percent of the men in residence halls, used parietal hours, Men's Residence Halls Association President Rick Schaefer said yesterday. A Daily Northwestern survey showed approximately 260 fraternity men participated.

Daily totals said 76 women entertained men in their rooms Sunday afternoon. Figures could not be obtained from Northwestern Apartments.

Six violations due to failure to use sign-in sheets were reported by Schaefer.

Warnings were sent to the six men involved.

Interfraternity Council President Gary Lomax and Associated Women Students President Trudy Porter said "no major violations" were reported to them.

1902 Sheridan, a 14-man living unit, voted down the parietal plan 7-7 last Thursday. A two-thirds vote is necessary for approval.

Chris Krasuski, a 1902 resident, said yesterday those voting against the proposal considered the hours too short and enforcement too strict.

"It simply is not worth the effort for such an insignificant program," Krasuski said.

Another resident, Bill Gibbons, said 1902 would vote down all parietal proposals unless they are for "24 hours a day, seven days a week."

Eight of the sororities contacted

yesterday reported that national charter stipulations forbid men above the first floor. They are Alpha Delta Pi, Alpha Epsilon Phi, Chi Omega, Delta Gamma, Gamma Phi Beta, Kappa Delta, and Zeta Tau Alpha. Alpha Omicron Pi can have parietal hours only on special occasions, according to Ann Dilworth, chapter president.

Five sororities voted not to have parietal hours. These include Alpha Chi Omega, Alpha Xi Delta, Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Kappa Gamma and Pi Beta Phi.

Alpha Phi and Shepard Hall will begin participating in parietal hours this weekend.

Delta Zeta will participate only Homecoming weekend and Nov. 10.

Allison Hall will vote tomorrow whether to participate. The proposal was approved in corridor meetings Sunday night, but must receive dorm-wide approval.

Delta Delta Delta still has not decided if it will participate, according to Alison Brown, chapter president.

Houses participating in parietal hours are Alpha Gamma Delta, Chapin Hall, Hobart House, 1900 Orrington, Northwestern Apartments, Rogers House, Sigma Delta Tau, and Willard Hall.

## New Sheil Chapel Cornerstone Laid
