Preparing for the Spring Semester FAQs...

When should I start working on my course site?

Spring term courses are now in Sakai; intercession courses are created when registration for them opens.

Should I merge my course sites?

If you have multiple sections of the same course, merging might be a great idea! Merged Sakai sites allow you to teach from a single course site instead of multiple sites.

To request a Sakai site merge, send an email (with the course name and section numbers) to sakaihelp@providence.edu.

New Sakai Tutorials

1. How to Drop the Lowest in Gradebook

This semester, the old Sakai gradebook (Gradebook 2) was no longer supported, and all faculty had to make the switch. Overall the feedback on the new Gradebook tool has been positive, but there are a few items that have caused some questions. One of the most common questions about the Gradebook is, “how can I drop the lowest grade from a category?”.

In other words, let’s say you give a lot of quizzes, and would like to drop the three lowest grades. Sakai Gradebook has always allowed for this function, and it is still quite easy to do:

1. Open the Gradebook tool
2. Click on the Settings Tab
3. Click on “Categories and Weighting”
4. Check off the box labeled, “Drop Lowest”
5. Now a column will appear where you can define how many grades within that category you would like to drop from the average.

2. Posting Student Videos to Sakai

Having students create video presentations as a course project can be a great way to engage them in using technology at a more advanced level, while also being a time saver by replacing lengthy in-class presentation sessions. Many instructors have begun to involve a student video element in their coursework, so we increasingly hear the questions, “how can students post their videos to Sakai?”

The first part to the answer is that we strongly advise against having students upload the videos directly to Sakai. Videos are large files, and Sakai courses have limited storage space. Additionally, video files can come in many formats, and it’s quite possible a student will upload a video format that you cannot open on your device.

Thus, there are two options for posting videos to Sakai. One option is to have the students upload the video to YouTube, where they can create a private, unsearchable video link that they can then share to Sakai. Another option is for students to upload the video to OneDrive, which is part of the Microsoft Cloud system that all students and faculty have access to.
