Student Wellbeing Key Performance Indicators: 2020 Data Report

Background of the Development of Key Performance Indicators

This document presents updated information on the student key performance indicators (KPIs) of the USC Well-being Collective, developed in partnerships with USC Student Affairs, USC Student Health, other campus units from the USC Well-being Collective and members of the student community.

Eight KPIs were selected from measures in the Healthy Minds and AlcoholEdu Surveys that have been implemented among the USC student population by the Office for Health Promotion Strategy at USC Student Health. These KPIs can be utilized to measure USC's progress toward achieving the common agenda of strengthening a culture driven by student wellbeing.

Data Sources

Baseline results of the KPIs were derived from the Healthy Minds Study I (HMS I) in the spring of 2018, the Healthy Minds Study II (HMS II) in the fall of 2018, and the 2018-2019 AlcoholEdu III Survey (AE1819) in May 2019. Updated results of the KPIs in 2020 were analyzed from the Student Well-being Index Survey in the spring of 2020 (SWIS I) and the 2019-2020 AlcoholEdu III Survey (AE1920) in May 2020.

Healthy Minds Study I and II

USC contracted the University of Michigan to implement the HMS in two phases in 2018. The HMS provides a detailed picture of mental health and related issues in college student populations. Schools typically use HMS data to identify needs and priorities, benchmark against peer institutions, evaluate programs and policies, plan for services and programs, and advocate for resources. HMS is approved by the Health Sciences and Behavioral Sciences Institutional Review Board at the University of Michigan.

The first phase of the HMS was conducted from March 19 to April 16, 2018. The HMS I included KPIs related to positive mental health, at-risk drinking, sexual assault, and upstanding behaviors. A sampling of 15,897 students: a random sampling of 4,000 undergraduates and 4,000 graduate students at the University Park Campus (UPC), a census population of 3,897 students at the Health Sciences Campus (HSC), and a random sampling of 4,000 graduate students from online programs were invited to participate in the HMS I. The overall participation rate for the HMS I was 28.6% (N = 4,543). Responses were weighted through the raking method by sex, race/ethnicity, degree program, and online or oncampus status to proportionally match census student population. The census student population data was provided from the Office of Institutional Research.

The second phase of the HMS was conducted from October 29 to December 9, 2018. The HMS II focused the KPIs related to sense of belonging, perceptions of fair and equitable treatment inside and outside of classrooms and other issues related to equity and inclusion. A total of 3,133 students out of 11,937 students (randomly sampling of 4,000 undergraduates and 4,000 graduate students at UPC and a census population of 3,937 graduate students at HSC) completed the HMS II. Similar to HMS I, responses were weighted through a raking method to better represent the entire student body. Data were weighted on gender, race/ethnicity, campus, and degree type using data provided by the Office of Institutional Research.



AlcoholEdu

AlcoholEdu is a research-based online alcohol education program designed to assist students in developing personal decision-making skills regarding alcohol use in college. All incoming first year and transfer undergraduate students are required to complete AlcoholEdu before the start of the semester and after six weeks in their first semester. Data on the rates of at-risk drinking among incoming undergraduate students were analyzed from the 2018-2019 AlcoholEdu Survey III as of May 1, 2019 and from the 2019-2020 AlcoholEdu Survey III as of May 12, 2020. Data were not weighted because all of the USC first-year and transfer undergraduates were required to complete the survey.

Student Well-being Index Survey

Student Well-being Index Survey (SWIS I) is an annual assessment tool to track the population health of USC students, developed by the Office for Health Promotion Strategy at USC Student Health. SWIS I provides timely data on health and wellbeing topics such as mental health, equity and inclusion, at-risk drinking, sexual violence, housing and financial insecurity, and COVID-19 for the USC community to identify priorities for appropriate resource allocation and programming, as well as to link research with policy and practice. A stratified random sample of 20,378 UPC students and a census sample of 3,461 HSC and 6,473 online students (a total of 30,313 students) were invited to participate in the SWIS from April 9 to May 8, 2020. At the end of data collection, 6,831 students completed the survey with the response rates of 22.5% with a margin of error of +/- 1.04% for the whole USC sample at the 95% confidence level. Data were subsequently weighted through a statistical raking procedure to reflect non-response by sex, race/ethnicity, school, degree level, and campus location. Survey participant characteristics for each of these data sources can be found in Table 3a-3c in the Appendix I: Survey Participant Characteristics.

Defining Key Performance Indicators

KPI 1: Positive sense of belonging. Sense of belonging is a composite index of 5 items (The Healthy Minds Network, 2018):

- I feel valued as an individual at this school
- I feel I belong at this school
- I have considered leaving this school because I felt isolated or unwelcomed (reversed coding)
- This school is a place where I am able to perform up to my full potential
- I have found one or more communities or groups where I feel I belong at this school

Respondents rated their agreement with these items from (1) strongly disagree to (5) strongly agree. Students with positive sense of belonging have a summative score of at least 20 out of 25 points on this index, an average of at least 4 (agree) on all items.

KPI 2: Perception on being treated fairly and equitably in classrooms and classroom settings.

Respondents rated their agreement from (1) strongly disagree to (5) strongly agree if 'I am treated fairly and equitably in classrooms and classroom settings,' (The Healthy Minds Network, 2018). Students who feel they are treated fairly and equitably answer either (4) agree or (5) strongly agree.

KPI 3: Perception on being treated fairly and equitably out-of-classroom university spaces.

Respondents rated their agreement from (1) strongly disagree to (5) strongly agree if 'I am treated fairly and equitably in out-of-classroom university spaces,' (The Healthy Minds Network, 2018). Students who feel they are treated fairly and equitably answer (4) agree or (5) strongly agree.

KPI 4: Positive Mental Health. Measured using the Flourishing Scale (Diener et al., 2010) with 8 items including:

- I lead a purposeful and meaningful life
- My social relationships are supportive and rewarding
- I am engaged and interested in my daily activities
- I actively contribute to the happiness and wellbeing of others
- I am competent and capable in the activities that are important to me
- I am a good person and live a good life
- I am optimistic about my future
- People respect me

Participants rated their agreement from (1) strongly disagree to (7) strongly agree. People with a positive mental health score 48 or more out of 56 in the scale, an average of at least 6 (agree) for all the items.

KPI 5-6: At risk-drinking. At-risk drinking is defined as 4 or more drinks for women, 5 or more drinks for men, and 4 or more drinks for unknown biological sex/intersex in one occasion for the past two weeks (National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, 2015).

KPI 7: Sexual assault. Participants were asked: 'In the past 12 months, have you experienced any unwanted sexual contact? Please count any experience of unwanted sexual contact, e.g., touching of your sexual body parts, oral sex, anal sex, sexual intercourse, and penetration of your vagina or anus with a finger or object] that you did not consent to and did not want to happen regardless of where it happened.' (The Healthy Minds Network, 2018).



KPI 8: Upstanding Behaviors. Upstanding Behavior is measured by students who have intervened for someone in at least one of the following situations: 1) drinking too much; 2) at risk of being sexually assaulted; 3) using harassing language towards others; 4) under emotional distress or suicidal; and 5) physical altercations (The Healthy Minds Network, 2018)

2020 Results of the 8 Key Performance Indicators

The following table demonstrates the 2018-2019 baseline and 2020 results of the eight student wellbeing KPIs.

For example, indicator #1 shows that USC students had a significant increase in positive sense of belonging of 3.2% from 43.1% in 2018 to 46.3% in 2020. Indicator #6 shows that 20.0% of incoming undergraduate students (first-year and transfer students) were engaged in at-risk drinking after spending 6 weeks on campus in the 2019/2020 academic year, a 1.4% decline from 21.4% in the 2018/2019 academic year.

 Data on positive sense of belonging, fairness & equity in and out of classroom, and upstanding behaviors were analyzed from on-campus survey participants only as online students were not asked these questions in the baseline surveys.

Summary of the Changes in KPI Findings from 2018-2019 Baseline to 2020

- Overall, all of the student wellbeing KPIs trend in the favorable direction from 2018-2019 baseline to 2020.
- In particular, four KPIs (positive sense of belonging, fairness and equity out of classroom, positive
 mental health, and upstanding behaviors) were found to have significant positive increase from
 the baseline in 2018-2019 to Spring 2020.
- Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, 56% of USC students who were enrolled at UPC or HSC continued to live on or near campus in Los Angeles and another 22% remained in California. While students moved to online classes, and practiced physical distancing, data demonstrate that students had more positive sense of belonging (+3.2%) and mental health (+5.7%) when compared to data from two years prior.
- The rates of at-risk drinking and sexual assault among USC students have decreased significantly by 15.8% and 2.5% respectively. These changes could be attributed to the stay-at-home order in Los Angeles during the data collection in 2020. The order required the closure of campuses, clubs, bars, restaurants, and other gathering places to prevent the spread of COVID-19. These environmental and policy changes might have limited students from accessing locations where alcohol over consumption and sexual assault were more likely to occur.
- Upstanding behaviors among students also increased by almost 10% from 34.6% to 44.3%. More
 students have stepped up to intervene when they witnessed someone engaged in discriminatory
 behaviors toward other students, drank too much alcohol, at risk of being in a situation where
 they could encounter sexual assault or physical assault, or were displaying suicidal and self-harm
 thoughts and behaviors.

Equity in Student Wellbeing in 2020

Refer to Table 4a – Table 4f in Appendix II: Disaggregated Student Wellbeing KPIs to see the
intricacies of intersectionality and extremely varied lived experience of USC students from
different identities (race/ethnicity, gender identity & sexual orientation, first generation status,
disability status, affiliation with the military, and program of study) in each KPI.

Positive Sense of Belonging

- First generation students reported almost 5% increase in positive sense of belonging from 35.3% in 2018 to 40.2% in 2020.
- Positive sense of belonging also increased significantly by 6.3% (from 42.0% in 2018 to 48.3% in 2019) among undergraduate students
- For 2020, Mixed-race (40.8%), Black/African American (41.6%), International Asian (43.1%) and Asian American (44.6%) students continued to be the racial/ethnic groups with the least sense of belonging at USC.
- Mixed-race and Black/African American students were 1.3 times less likely than White students to have a positive sense of belonging at USC.
- LGBTQ+ students were also 1.3 times less likely than cis-heterosexual students to have a
 positive sense of belonging

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Fairness and Equity in and out of the Classroom

- Only 67% of Indigenous and Black/African American students felt they were treated fairly and equitably in the classrooms compared to 80% or more of students from other races and ethnicities.
- Among the first-generation students, more reported to be treated fairly and equitably outside the classrooms at USC from 72.2% in 2018 to 76.2% in 2020.
- Nevertheless, first generation students were still 1.5 more likely to feel they were not treated fairly and equitably out of the classrooms than non-first generation students.

Positive Mental Health

- Asian American (45.3%), International (46.5% International Asian and 50.0% International Non-Asian), Mixed-Race (50.2%) and LGBTQ+ (40.9%) students had the lowest rates of positive mental health.
- Students with one or more disabilities were 1.5 times less likely than students without a disability to have positive mental health.
- Positive mental health intersected with age, gender identity, sexual orientation and race/ethnicity: While 55.9% of Black students from the whole USC population might have positive mental health, only 7.9% of Black LGBTQ+ undergraduates students had positive mental health, followed by 33.3% of Asian American LGBTQ+ and 33.5% of White LGBTQ+ undergraduates.

At-risk Drinking

- AlcoholEdu data before Spring Break in 2020 show that the rates of at-risk drinking among incoming undergraduates were trending down across most racial groups from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 academic calendar year.
- However, at-risk drinking among international students went up from 6.1% to 9.7% among International Asian and 22.3% to 27.2% among International Non-Asian students.
- After USC moved most of its on-campus classes to online instruction during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the prevalence of at-risk drinking decreased significantly across all demographics when compared to data from Spring 2018.
 - o 50.3% to 31.3% (-19.0%) among White students
 - o 45.2% to 26.3% (-18.9%) among Mixed-race students
 - o 41.0% to 22.5% (-18.5%) among cis heterosexual male students
 - o 35.6% to 21.7% (-13.9%) among cis heterosexual female students
 - 42.1% to 25.9% (-16.2%) among LGBTQ+ students
 - o 45.4% to 25.3% (-20.1%) among undergraduate students

Sexual Assault

- Students with disability across gender identity/sexual orientations and all programs of study were 2 times more likely than those without disability to experience unwanted sexual contact in the past 12 months
- 8% of undergraduate students and 2.6% of graduate students across all gender identity/sexual orientations have experienced unwanted sexual contact in the past 12 months

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Upstanding Behaviors

- More than half of Mixed-race, White, Black/African American and Middle Eastern/Arab American students have intervened to support someone on USC campus who they witnessed to have been drinking too much, at risk of being sexually or physically assaulted, being verbally harassed, or under emotional distress.
- Less international students (39.1% non-Asian and 22.2% Asian) reported to have engaged in upstanding behaviors due to different cultures and fear of negative consequences on their immigration and educational status.
- 40.3% of cis-heterosexual male, 45.8% of cis-heterosexual female, and 49.0% of LGBTQ+ students have engaged in upstanding behaviors
- Most of upstanding behaviors were reported from undergraduate students (63%), compared to graduate students (less than 30%).
