




## A note from our President

## **Scholarship News**

It is difficult for me to believe it has been over two years since we have been able to all meet together. I want to make certain you all know that the AAIE Scholarship Program has not been sitting idle during this Covid pandemic. Academy Endowments have grown \$1,000,000 since our last public meeting in 2019 thru today, and now exceed \$3,900,000. Investment gains due to a strong market account for a large portion of the growth; however, AAIE members continue to show their support for all four Scholarship Programs. Donations are down a little during the period but are still exceeding \$100,000 annually (\$122,000 in 2020-21).

More importantly AAIE Endowments are generating funds capable of providing more than \$110,000 in new scholarships annually, and that number continues to grow. I believe our current Endowments will be funding \$150,000 in new scholarships annually by 2023.

However, with virtual Annual Meetings in both 2020 and 2021, we have been unable to properly recognize our Scholarship Donors. It is my pleasure to inform you that since the April 2019 Annual Meeting the Academy has '8' new John Imhoff Fellows, '4' new One Time Named Scholarships and '9' new Permanent Named Scholarships. (Please see charts below for the full list.)

How do we keep on growing? Well, let's keep doing what we've been doing. Pick your favorite Scholarship Program (Academic, Financial Need, John Imhoff Global Studies or Graduate Studies) and make a donation. History shows that very few Academy members reached John Imhoff Fellow or Named Scholarship level with their first donation. The vast majority started with smaller donations and continued from there. It has worked for 35 years, and it can continue to work.



quarter, and we have another Staff Employee of the Quarter in the department – Sandy Sehon! Sandy is the department's fiscal manager and we are so proud of her.



## A4U Update—by Ross Tompkins and John True

Mentor circles stayed strong in the fall of 2021. There were 21 total mentors across 10 circles, with 4 students per circle. This year had two dedicated circles for Graduate Students since their needs are different than those of the undergrads. Circles had the option to be in person or virtual, and all elected to virtual this fall.

Mock interviews were also held this fall, with 15 students participating and 6 companies represented: CapSpire, JB Hunt, FedEx, ArcBest, CenterPoint, and Harrison.
